Dear Basin Stakeholders:

Like many of you, the Basin School District is facing very challenging economic times. For districts all across the state, shrinking revenues and increasing costs have forced administrators to make very difficult decisions. Fortunately, the administrative team here has worked closely with the staff and the board of trustees to craft a budget that will allow us to maintain the integrity of our educational programs, which is our primary goal. However, in order to do that we had to reduce staffing and say goodbye to several dedicated individuals who, through no fault of their own, will no longer be with us. We are all sorry to see them go and wish them well.

What these changes mean for the district is that class sizes will be a bit larger than they have been in the past, but still well below those in the valley. We will be moving some teachers into the main buildings which will allow us to vacate two portables, thereby saving valuable district resources. Additionally, some of the buildings and grounds upgrades will be put on hold for the foreseeable future. Our hope is that the cost-cutting measures we are implementing now will save us from more drastic steps next year. Many districts have run supplemental levies to help make up for the shortfall. This is something that we would like to avoid, although if the state orders an additional 5% holdback, we may have no other choice. As for athletic programs, a committee of patrons will be meeting this summer with district administrators to coordinate fundraising activities. Of particular interest is the activity bus which is a luxury on which many families depend, but that the district can no longer afford outright. The district will keep you posted as to the progress of this group and looks forward to any contributions to the effort that you can make.

We are being asked to do more with less and we will rise up to the challenge. The level of commitment that I have seen from the staff, despite the challenges that lie ahead, has been nothing short of incredible. As a result, I am confident that we will emerge from this financial crisis as a leaner, more efficient organization that continues to provide an excellent education for our students.

Registration Information and Supply Lists

Registration Information

Registration: Pre-K – 6th

Returning elementary students do not have to register; insurance forms, new emergency cards and any other pertinent papers will be sent home with returning students after the school year begins.

Elementary students who are new to the district can register between 8:00 am and 2:00 pm at the elementary office beginning Thursday, August 19th. Please bring immunization records and certified birth certificates.

Registration: Middle and High School

Returning Students: Thursday August 19th from 9:00 am – 12:30 pm and 1:30 pm – 7:30 pm

New Students: Any weekday beginning Friday, August 20th, from 9:00am – 3: 00 pm.

New Students: Please bring Birth Certificate and Immunization records as well as Transcripts if you have them.

Immunizations

The legislature passed a bill (I.C. 39-4801) requiring the immunization of all school children. The following chart is one recommended schedule for accomplishing the desired immunizations. The school requires documentation of your child's immunization record at the time of registration.

Current rules and regulations regarding immunizations:

The parent or guardian of any child who is attending any public, private, or parochial school in Idaho must comply with the provisions contained in the Chapter noted below:

Evidence of Immunization Status

Within the deadlines in Manual Section 2-15101, a parent, custodian or legal guardian of each child must present one of the following to school authorities:

1. Proof of Immunization - an immunization certification statement signed by a physician or a physician's representative stating the type, number and dates of immunizations received.
2. Exemptions to Immunization Requirement: Please call the school for more information.

If your child has not already received measles, mumps and rubella immunizations, they are needed. All children born after November 21, 1991 must have their HEP B immunizations completed to enroll in school.

School Breakfast and Lunch Programs

Basin School District Child Find

Child Find is a service of the Idaho State Department of Education and Basin School District 72. Child Find helps us find children between 3 and 21 years of age who may have individual needs resulting from disabilities or developmental delays. Child Find helps determine what kind of educational services would best meet his or her needs. These children may have difficulty walking, talking, hearing, learning, or may have behavioral problems.

Children that are referred to Child Find may be entitled to Special Education and related services. Early identification is critical for long term success. Children referred to Child Find will receive screenings and/or evaluations to determine if he/she is eligible for services. Screenings and evaluations can include: vision, hearing, speech, language development, gross motor skills (sitting, walking, etc.), fine motor development (picking up toys, holding a spoon), cognitive development (thinking, problem solving, etc.), academic achievement, and adaptive behavior.

If you think that your child may benefit from Special Education or other related services, contact Beth Woodruff at 392-4183 EXT 261. Students who attend private school or who are home-schooled may also be eligible for some services from Basin School District. Call Idaho Care Line at 1-800-926-2588 if you have a child younger than three years old that may benefit from early intervention.

Basin School District does not discriminate on the basis of race, gender, or disability. - In a shelter, motel, vehicle or campground
- On the street
- In an abandoned building, trailer or other inadequate accommodations
- Doubled up with friends or relatives because you cannot find affordable housing

Highly Able Program

Basin School District recognizes that students with identified gifts and talents may require differentiated instruction and opportunities. Administrators and staff will work together to ensure that the educational needs of highly able students are met in the regular classroom or through flexible scheduling options.

Definition of Highly Able:

A gifted and/or talented child, or highly able person, is one who displays superior ability in mastering skills and concepts in one or more talent areas and who needs/desires educational experiences not ordinarily offered in the regular school curriculum. If you believe that your child may be eligible for these services, talk with your child's teacher and administrator.

Elementary Options:

- Ability Grouping with enrichment in math and reading (cross grade grouping)
- Enrichment within subject matter in the regular classroom
- Differentiated curriculum according to content, process, and product
- Subject or grade acceleration (skipping)
- Dual enrollment (taking one or more middle/high school classes)

Secondary Options:

- Flexible scheduling
- Enrichment within a class
- Mentorships
- Independent project/study
- Differentiated curriculum according to content, process, and project
- Correspondence courses
- Acceleration (grade skipping) up to the 9th grade
- Dual enrollment (middle school and high school classes, or high school and college classes)
- Cluster grouping (College Prep classes)
- Portfolio and ability waiving of lower classes in art, music, and computer

- Aggressive career counseling and referral to TRIO
- Testing out for higher placement
- Distance learning (regular and Advanced Placement)
- Micron Science and Math program for 8th grade
- Study groups for PSAT, ACT, SAT

Levy Information

Basin Elementary Information and Programs

The teachers, parents and students at Basin Elementary all work together as a community of learners to provide the best education possible for all students. All preschool through sixth grade students are offered an exceptional education with enriching activities and educational support in a safe and nurturing learning environment. We are focused on student achievement and personal growth.

The staff works diligently to meet the diverse needs of its students by providing leveled times for reading and math. Each student participates in a supplemental reading block time where students can be challenged with instruction at their personal level. Students in grades four through six are also placed in leveled math groups. These leveled opportunities increase student achievement by allowing students to either review missed content and skills or be challenged with material that is beyond their grade level.

At Basin Elementary, students are expected to model behavior based on four guiding principles:

responsibility, citizenship, respect and integrity. Throughout the year, students learn about these character traits and how they are applied in our school environment. Our school atmosphere encourages students and staff to be our very best in all ways.

Basin Elementary is fortunate to have a dedicated staff that works diligently to provide students with meaningful learning experiences that will help each student make academic and social growth, which will lead to a solid educational foundation.

Basin Elementary Programs

Prime Time for Kids

Prime Time for Kids is an after school program for students in first through sixth grade. Students choose to attend either a Tuesday or Wednesday session each week. Best practice program, Positive Action, teaches students about drug prevention as well as character education. A snack and drink are provided. There are a total of twenty-five sessions throughout the school year. Prime Time for Kids offers tutoring, mentoring, educational computer games, recreational and art activities. For additional information and to sign up look for a flyer this fall.

Athletics

Sixth grade students may have the opportunity to participate on the Idaho City Middle School athletic teams, if there are positions available. This may vary year to year and sport to sport. If your child is interested in playing on a middle school sports team, see pages 16-19 and contact the high school.

Elementary Band

Fourth and fifth grade students may take elementary band classes throughout the school year. More information will be made available at registration.

After School Tutoring

After school tutoring opportunities are offered to students at various times throughout the year.

Jumpstart Preschool Program

JumpStart Preschool is open to children in the district who are four years old by September 1, 2010, to five year olds who do not meet the deadline for entering kindergarten, and to three year olds who have special needs such as developmental, cognitive, speech or language delays. JumpStart Preschool will be in session Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays for full days starting Tuesday, September 14. The district will be providing free breakfasts for all students. You may purchase hot lunch for your child or send a cold lunch. Free and reduced hot lunch is avail-

able for those families who qualify. The district provides transportation to and from school for those students who live in outlying areas of the district.

Tuition for preschool is \$200 per trimester or \$600 for the year. Full and partial scholarships may be available for those who need financial assistance. Children with special needs do not pay tuition.

If you believe your child may have a developmental delay, please contact Basin Elementary and speak to the Special Education Department Director or teacher. The preschool classroom is located at 109 Placer Street. The entrance to the preschool is the door on the high school parking lot side of the house. For more information, call Basin Elementary at 392-6631.

Idaho City Middle/High School Information and Programs

We have an excellent staff who are honored to work with the youth in our community. Our goal is to educate the whole student to help each individual become a successful, contributing member of our global community. Our continuing focus on academic excellence, character and service is producing students who have the skills and confidence to take their education to the next level. In the fourteen short years the high school has been open we have had outstanding graduates who are pursuing careers in law, medicine and government service. Together they serve as an inspiration to those who will follow.

Wildcat Pride!!

Athletics are an integral part of our educational program here at ICHS/MS. For a 1A school (the smallest classification in Idaho) we offer a variety of programs including: Cross Country, Football, Volleyball, Basketball, Track and Cheerleading. Two thirds of our secondary students (grades 7-12) participate in at least one sport.

Idaho City High School Athletics

Sports physicals are required prior to the first day of practice. Sports packets are in the high school office. Basin Community Health Center will be doing physicals on Saturday August 7th from 9:00am – 12:00pm for \$25 and will donate the proceeds to the athletic program at Basin School District. No appointment necessary. Students will need to pick up a physical form at the high school office.

Athletes are required to pay a sports participation fee and purchase a Student Activity Card. Participation fees are used for uniforms, equipment and supplies while proceeds from activity cards are used for paying referees, umpires, time keepers, etc.

Insurance and Requirements
